Designation of German 433 as a Web-Oriented Course

During the current global health crisis, The University of British Columbia is taking direction from the Provincial Ministry of Health, the Provincial Health Officer, and Vancouver Coastal Health. In compliance with the physical distancing protocols initiated by these agencies, the University has directed that courses offered in Term 2 of the Winter Session 2020-2021 be provided remotely. In consequence of this directive, German 433 has been rearticulated for delivery online.

PREREQUISITES

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Please note: GERM 433 is restricted to beginners or to students with no more than one term of beginner's German (GERM 100 or equivalent). If you have already taken German courses beyond Germ 100, please talk to your instructor.

GERM 433 is not available for credit toward a Major or Honors program in German and **does not** satisfy the language requirement of the Faculty of Arts.

COURSE STRUCTURE

German for Reading Knowledge is designed as a guided self-study course so that students can work independently. The focus is on developing the necessary skills to read a variety of authentic German texts such as excerpts from scholarly texts, essays, reports, newspaper/newsmagazine articles, table of contents, charts etc. The selection of material also promotes intercultural learning and the development of an international awareness.

Instruction in German 433 will be provided through a combination of synchronous and asynchronous approaches to learning. Students will be required to attend regularly scheduled synchronous class sessions online at which they will have the opportunity to participate and complete in class activities on CANVAS. Most synchronous instructions will integrate a combination of lecture, question and answer sessions, whole-class participation, and individual work. During these synchronous class sessions students will have to write four Quizzes and two Unit Test as scheduled in this Course Outline on page 7.

Learning success will also be determined by the completion of the independent course work assigned for pre and post classes (asynchronous approach). This includes e. g. viewing a video related to specific topics, researching additional sources for a better understanding of a text or the completion of an assignment to be uploaded on CANVAS as indicated. The results will be addressed in scheduled meetings online (synchronous approach) or answer keys will be provided in the weekly modules (asynchronous approach).

Learning to read in a foreign language requires sustained engagement with the material to be learned. German 433 emphasizes the responsibility of students for their own learning; therefore, students are expected to engage regularly also in the assigned asynchronous activities.

For most of the online course interaction and virtual instructional meetings, students will be using CANVAS, UBC's online learning management platform. It will be used by the instructor to facilitate regular online communication and for such other varied purposes as accessing course material, initiating discussions and undertaking quizzes, tests and exams.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will develop a variety of strategies and acquire reading skills in German to apply in their own discipline or research field, or individual area of interest:

- skim through a text to make predictions and educated guesses;
- use the title, layout, typeface, illustrations and images as a source of information;
- develop and expand on reading vocabulary according to the theme of a given text;
- deduce the meaning of unfamiliar lexical items through the understanding of word formation and the use of contextual clues;
- develop and understand necessary grammatical and syntactical concepts for reading and comprehending German texts with the aid of a dictionary;
- writing summaries in English of selected text excerpts;
- enhance your understanding of your own cultural background in the context of German reading.

When working through the course material, it is important to follow the suggested order of tasks before moving on to the next one. Later, when reviewing, students can go over the material in any order, and concentrate on selected topics as necessary. By following these steps, students will be more successful in their learning process.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

GERM 433 focuses on reading and understanding authentic German texts as well as written responses in English to related questions. The class dynamics and interaction are different from language classes where students pursue different objectives and actively engage in producing the target language.

A wide variety of pedagogical tasks ensures that students engage in meaningful activities. They practice recognition of words and word formation, phrases, sentence patterns, grammatical structures, text genres and their discourse organization. Simultaneously they expand the reading vocabulary which is organized according to the theme of a text.

Additional exercises include multiple choice tasks, true/false task, identifying lexical and grammatical items in context, content questions and text summary in English. Students will complete these activities individually or with a partner. They share and comment on their answers in class (synchronous approach). In case students are not able to log in to a scheduled synchronous class session they will find the information and answer keys on CANVAS, *GERM 433-905* in the Module area.

Therefore, it is important to regularly check GERM 433-905 on CANVAS throughout the term.

Except for quizzes, tests and exams, students are allowed to resort to other suitable electronic devices and resources in their learning activities, e. g. online dictionaries such as: <https://www.dict.cc/>; LEO:<https://dict.leo.org/german-english/>; PONS:

TECHNICAL MATERIALS

The following technical equipment is required for all students of GERM 433:

1. A reliable computer with built-in microphone and speakers (headset with microphone is optional)
2. A webcam (either built in to your computer or external)
3. Reliable access to the internet
4. A browser that supports the viewing of videos and listening to audio files

6. A space suitable for learning and study

Students will need a computer that has video and audio capacity; for instance, the capacity to view and download documents, including power point presentations. Assessments will require the installation of the *Canvas* LockDown Browser and if possible also a German keyboard. Also essential is a strong and stable internet connection and an environment free of disturbances and distractions.

Assessment Content and Format

Preparation and Participation (8%):

Preparation and participation include:

- 3 PREP Tests on CANVAS (4%)
- 4 Demo Quizzes on CANVAS (4%)

Students will prepare for Test 1, Test 2, and the Final Exam by way of three PREP Tests. The prep test can be considered as a “blueprint” for the actual unit test in terms of topic, length of text, (approx. 190-200 words) and respectively final exam (~400 words), type of tasks, content and grammar questions. The prep tests can be accessed in the Assignment area on UBC CANVAS and repeated multiple times.

Students will prepare for four Quizzes by way of four Demo Quizzes. The Demo Quizzes can also be accessed in the Assignment area on UBC CANVAS and repeated multiple times.

TEST 1 (20%):

Test 1 will cover materials from KG1.1 up to including KG2.3. Students will write TEST 1 during the synchronous class session on Mon., February 8, with Lockdown Browser. Students will have **one** attempt and will have 60 minutes to complete the test. It will be accessible *on UBC CANVAS* in the *Assignment* area.

TEST 2 (25%):

Test 2 will cover materials from KG2.5 up to including KG4.3. Students will write TEST 2 during the synchronous class session on Mon., March 22, with Lockdown Browser. Students will have **one** attempt and will have 60 minutes to complete the test. It also will be accessible *on UBC CANVAS* in the *Assignment* area.

4 QUIZZES (12%):

The four Quizzes (3% each, **one** attempt and 20 minutes each) will also be delivered on *UBC CANVAS* in the *Assignment* area during the synchronous class session, with LockdownBrowser. They will cover the material as indicated in the corresponding Demo Quiz.

Final Examination (35%):

Final Examination will cover all materials from the textbook, KG1.1- KG5.5. Students will have **one** attempt and will have 150 minutes (2.5 hours) to complete the exam. It will be accessible *on UBC CANVAS* in the *Assignment* area with LockdownBrowser.
