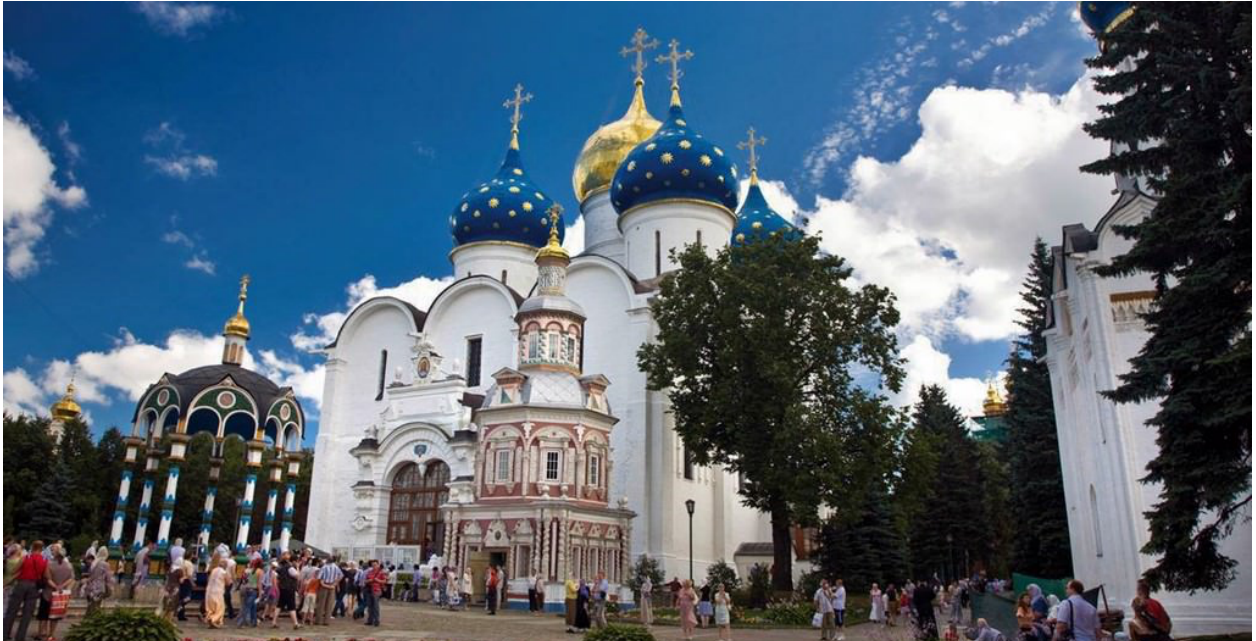


Course Syllabus

Learning Outcomes

After successfully completing RUSS 201, you will **be able to**

- apply and expand language skills learned in RUSS 100 or 102 to everyday situations and topics, such as holidays, discussing likes and dislikes, the weather and the Russian view of nature, travel, food, marriage, and family plans.
- maintain dialogues in short social exchanges;
- use in writing and in speech Russian nouns, pronouns, and adjectives in all cases;
- use present, past and future tenses of verbs, Perfective and Imperfective aspects;
- recognize and use approximately 1,000 -1,200 Russian words in conversation and/or composition;

- apply techniques to improve pronunciation and conversational fluency;
- understand native speakers in both everyday conversation

Assignments and Assessment

Attendance (5%)

Home assignments (7%)

Home assignments are mandatory, and they have to be handed in in class or submitted before class on Canvas to Home Assignment section before each class. Home assignments have the pass/fail value, which means you will get a full mark for each submitted assignment with 70% correct answers. Home assignments submitted after the due date will receive 80% of the grade. No home assignment will be accepted after the end of classes.

Oral assignments (8%)

There are two oral assignments in this class:

1. audio recording N 1 (3%)

2. audio recording N 2 (5%).

For the audio recording assignments, you will be asked to record a speech and submit your recordings to your instructor for evaluation. These assignments will be done at home. Audio recording N 1 will include reading any text of your choice. Audio recording N 2 will include talking about a certain aspect of life, or telling a story. The focus of these assignments is pronunciation and intonation. While preparing your recordings, please pay attention to the following: stresses, vowel reduction, the pronunciation of the soft consonants and the Russian «И».

Outstanding (90-100%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Pronunciation and intonation are very clear and accurate through the whole assignment. There were no pronunciation errors.
Competent (80-89%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Pronunciation and intonation are clear and accurate most of the time. There were a few occasional minor errors that did not prevent understanding.
Satisfactory (70-79%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Pronunciation and intonation are not clear. There were persistent pronunciation errors, but they did not prevent understanding.
Adequate (50-69%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Pronunciation and intonation are not clear. There were persistent errors, and some of them prevented understanding.•
Inadequate (0 %)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The assignment has not been submitted.

Online quizzes (15%)

There will be 12 open book online quizzes posted on Canvas, which will permit you to assess what you know and what you do not know. The online quizzes can be completed at students' own pace. Online quizzes submitted after the due date receive 80% of the grade.

Chapter tests (30%)

After each chapter except Chapter 18, there will be a written test. The tests will be 25-30 minute-long, and they will cover both grammar and vocabulary. Details of each test will be announced the week prior to the quiz date. There will be 5 tests, and each test is worth 6 %.

Final exam (35%)

The final exam is a cumulative 2 hour long written exam which consists of the following components: answering questions, fill in the blanks, multiple choice, reading comprehension and one short essay (about 10-12 sentences). The mock exam will be posted on Canvas as an online test with multiple attempts so that you could practice it before the exam.

Scoring Rubric for the Final Exam

Exceptional (90-100%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Uses many different sentence structures, depending on contexts• Virtually no grammar and/or spelling errors.
Outstanding (80-89%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Uses a variety of sentence structures and makes some errors.• Very few grammar and/or spelling errors.
Competent (70-79%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Uses a variety of sentence structures and makes frequent errors, or• Uses basic sentence structures with only a few errors.• Very few grammar and/or spelling errors.
Satisfactory (60-69%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Uses only basic sentence structure.• Contains many grammatical and/or spelling errors which do not affect understanding.
Adequate (50-59 %)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Uses only basic structures• Contains enough errors in grammar and/or spelling that understanding is affected.• A native speaker would have problems understanding the narrative.
Inadequate (0-49%)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Can't use appropriate sentence structures.• Uses only a few words and expressions or inadequate vocabulary.• Egregious errors in grammar and/or spelling.• Impossible to understand.

In exceptional cases, the final course marks may be adjusted in order to conform to Departmental policy.

Course Format

Classes will be conducted in an interactive, seminar style, using a combination of the explicit teaching of the Russian language using instructor's explanations and/or demonstrations of the material, direct instruction, small and large group discussion, and small and large group activities.
