Acknowledgement

I acknowledge that I am an uninvited guest on stolen land. UBC's Point Grey Campus is located on the traditional, ancestral, and unceded territory of the x^wməθk^wəyəm (Musqueam) people. What We'll Need: Course Materials

Digital access to the textbook **SAG MAL!** ("Zahg mahl"): An Introduction to German Language and Culture. 3rd Student Edition, by Christine Anton & Tobias Barske. Student Package with Online Access Code to Supersite Plus (SSPlus) and Web Student Activities Manual (wSAM).

Sag mal! is available through the UBC Bookstore in a digital format. That means you can buy it online and avoid the long lines. It includes either a 6-, 12- or 36-month access code to Supersite, the online platform integrated with the Sag mal! materials. The German Language Program uses all of the Sag mal! textbook through its first four semesters (GERN 101, 102, 201 and 202).

Costs for the materials with a 6-month access code: \$119.95 [9781543319781]; Costs for the materials with a 12-month access code: \$174.70 [9781543329087]; Costs for the materials with a 36-month access code: \$206.56 [9781543316070]. You'll need your access code as quickly as possible, so you can do your homework and start practicing German. As soon as you purchase your access code, register as a student in this UBC class: **GERN 101 Learning German 1 Section 102** and check for your assignments.

Please note that the bookstore also offers more costly packages that contain grammar slides (in German). They are <u>not</u> required and would be for self-study only. You'll also need CANVAS.

What We'll Learn: Course Learning Outcomes

We learn:

- to speak and write in German about family, friends, studies, interests and leisure, opinions and attitudes;
- to apply language skills when communicating with speakers of German, such as greetings, introductions, requests for information, descriptions of people, expression of ownership, giving instructions, asking and answering questions;
- to **comprehend and enjoy** fundamental spoken and written German and become aware of the lexical and structural characteristics of the German language;
- to apply learning strategies to German, as well as future language learning;
- to get to know the **rich dimensions of human diversity** that characterize Germanophone cultures, including but not limited to linguistic, racial, ethnic, social, regional, gender and ability difference;
- to enhance understanding of our own languages and cultural backgrounds.

Homework: Sag Mal! Supersite Assignments (20%)

Your textbook is linked to a great online platform called Supersite, where you will practice grammar, vocabulary, and other knowledge introduced in each chapter for every class period (always due on the day before class at 11:59 p.m. at the latest). You have unlimited attempts to do each assignment and will <u>not</u> be evaluated on accuracy. If you do the homework on time you will get 100% of the grade; if you are late by one weekday you will get 90% of the grade; if you are late by two weekdays you will get

80% of the grade; if you are late by more than two weekdays, but less than 7 weekdays, you will get 50% of the grade. Any later submission will result in 0% (unless you have concession, see UBC policies).

Portfolio (14%)

The portfolio is an ongoing document for your personal exploration with German. You will hand in contributions for the portfolio three times in the semester (see details on Canvas). The portfolio will not be graded until you submit the 3rd one. However, you will receive 1% of the Portfolio grade for punctual submission of each (total 3%); you will loose the 3% if you do submit after the due date (unless you have concession, see UBC policies).

Chapter Check-ins (36% or 3 x 12%)

At the end of each chapter in Sag mal!, you will complete a short (ca. 30 minute) online quiz at home. These will be available on Canvas for a 24-hour period (always on a Friday, please see schedule). [There are no traditional final exams or midterms in this course.]

Listening Challenges (15% or 3 x 5%)

Three times in a semester, you will do a very short listening comprehension task so you can track your comprehension over time. The listening comprehension tasks consist of a very short recording of spoken German and a set of basic comprehension questions about it. They will be available on Canvas for a 24-hour period (always on a Friday, please see schedule).

Oral Assessments (15% or 3 x 5%)

The first oral assessment will be a small group assignment on NOV 13, 2025 in class. The second one will be a Vlog (short video clip); it is due at the end of the term (DEC 9, 2025) and more details will be communicated later in the term.

For the 3rd one, I will evaluate (mostly the quantity of) your oral contributions in class over the course of the entire semester.
