PREREQUISITES

PREREQUISITES: No prerequisite, no textbook, NO FORMAL FINAL EXAM! Only a hard copy dictionary is needed.

Please note: GERN 304 (former GERM 433) is restricted to beginners or to students with no more than one term of beginner's German (**GERN 101**, former GERM 100 or equivalent). If you have already taken German courses beyond **GERN 101**, (former GERM 100), please talk to your instructor.

GERN 304 (former GERM 433) is **not available** for credit toward a Major or Honors program in German and **does not** satisfy the language requirement of the Faculty of Arts.

COURSE OVERVIEW

GERN 304, *Pathways to Reading German* is an interactive online guided self-study German for Reading Knowledge course. The course contains a wide range of authentic reading material that is of interest to students in the Humanities, Arts, Social Sciences and Sciences. The **GERN 304** will take place synchronously online on ZOOM and will be complemented with asynchronous online learning activities. Students are expected to regularly log on to the scheduled synchronous class sessions.

The teaching and learning contexts are diverse and the program is cost-effective since the course material ***Pathways to Reading German*** and any additional resources are integrated in **GERN 304**, on the UBC CANVAS Learning Management Platform.

The reading program focuses on developing the necessary skills to read a variety of authentic German texts such as excerpts from scholarly texts, essays, reports, interviews, newspaper/newsmagazine articles, table of contents, maps, charts etc. The selection of material includes also a wide range of links to secondary sources to further promote and expand on intercultural learning and the development of an international awareness that go beyond the course material.

The course differs from usual in-class language instruction in that the format is characterized by traditional lectures in combination with the review of the assigned reading material, selected online *Übungen* (exercises) and i-Clicker activities on UBC CANVAS. These activities are followed by a question and answer sessions online.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will:

- develop a variety of strategies and acquire reading skills in German to apply in their own discipline or research field, or individual area of interest
- develop and understand necessary grammatical and syntactical concepts for reading and comprehending German texts
- develop and expand on reading vocabulary according to the theme of a given text
- write summaries in English of selected German text excerpts
- enhance their understanding of intercultural and international awareness in the context of reading German texts and researching of secondary sources.

COURSE ORGANIZATION & LEARNING ACTIVITIES

GERN 304, *Pathways to Reading German* is organized in **20 Explorations** which are located in the Module area on the UBC CANVAS platform. Each Exploration is organized in a number of Sections which introduce a new topic with texts, concepts and exercises (i. e. *Übungen*). The suggested self-study approach is to work through 1-2 Explorations on average per week.

The *Übungen* are located in the EXPLORATIONS in the Module area on UBC CANVAS. They include online activities such as Multiple Choice, True False, Fill in the Blanks, Fill in Multiple Blanks, Multiple Answers, Multiple Dropdowns, Matching, Essay Questions. These *Übungen* ensure that students engage and stay engaged in a meaningful way by completing the tasks and activities when working through the online program. The online *Übungen* can be repeated and reviewed multiple times throughout the course.

At the end of each Exploration there is a *Reflection* and an *Application* section. In the *Reflection* section students review the structures, strategies and grammar that have been introduced. In the *Application* section students apply and practice in a new context what has been introduced in that Exploration.

Most Exploration also include a vocabulary list referring to the topic of the Exploration. Students are free to add any words they consider important. There are also some Explorations where students are asked to develop their own vocabulary list with words they consider important or useful.

Further details in regard to the online Explorations on CANVAS are demonstrated in three videos. They are located on the GERN 304-102 homepage in Videos: How to navigate the GERN 304 Explorations on CANVAS. The online program will give students more flexibility with respect to the organization of their study time since the course material including all *Übungen* and answer keys are accessible at any time.

PRACTICE TESTS

Students will prepare for Test 1 and Test 2 by way of a Practice test (7% + 8% = 15% total). The practice tests can be considered as a “blueprint” for the actual unit tests in terms of topic, length of text (approx. 190-200 words), and type of tasks. The practice tests are available on UBC CANVAS and have to be written in **Lockdown Browser**. Students will have **three attempts** of 60 minutes each. The highest attempt will count.

TEST 1 (10%):

Test 1 will cover materials from Exploration 1 up to Exploration 7. Students will write TEST 1 during the regular lecture on Thursday, February 8 **on ZOOM with camera on**. Students are only to use a hardcopy dictionary and their notes but no additional electronic devices. Students will have one attempt and 60 minutes to complete the test. It will be available *on UBC CANVAS*.

TEST 2 (15%):

Test 2 will cover materials from Exploration 8 up to Exploration 16. Students will write TEST 2 during the regular lecture on Thursday, March 14 **on ZOOM with camera on**. Students are only to use a hardcopy dictionary and their notes but no additional electronic devices. Students will have one attempt and 60 minutes to complete the test. It will be available *on UBC CANVAS*.

REFLECTIONS (10%):

The reflections will take a “snapshot” of the Explorations and activities, (i.e. Übungen & i-clicker activities) covered up to Exploration 18. They are a preparation for the Final Reading Assignment in terms of type of tasks, content and grammar questions. Students will write the REFLECTIONS during the regular lecture on Thursday, April 4 **on ZOOM with camera on**. Students are only to use a hardcopy dictionary and their notes but no additional electronic devices. Students will have one attempt and **30 minutes** to complete the REFLECTIONS. It will be available *on UBC CANVAS*.

FINAL READING ASSIGNMENT (20%):

At the end of the course student will complete a Final Reading Assignment at home online in **Lockdown Browser** that will cover the material from all the EXPLORATIONS in the online program *Pathways to Reading German* and will replace the formal final exam. It has the same format and type of tasks as the previous Unit tests and *Übungen* in the EXPLORATIONS.

The Final Reading Assignment will be available from Monday, April 15, 8:00 am and is due by Tuesday, April 16, 11:59 pm.

During that time students can log on at their convenience and will have one attempt and **120 minutes (2 hours)** to complete the final reading assignment online in **Lockdown Browser**.

The grading criteria are consistent with the criteria established by the Faculty of Arts.
